

We need to examine the tendency in all of us to assume that because we have discussed a subject, or have studied that subject, that we have those things in place and in daily practice in our lives.

#### Nothing could be more misleading.

When Jesus said, "Why call me Lord, Lord, and do not the things which I command".

He was directing our attention to the possibility of having things in 'word only' in our lives and not 'in deed'.

John 8:31 reads



"If ye continue in my word= in living out the things which I say - ye shall be disciples indeed."

Being disciples <u>indeed</u> is our objective in all our studies together. Let's look then at the Foundation Stone of prayer.

Do we remember the illustration of the cactus that was used in a biological experiment? Scientists wanted to see how long this particular variety could go without water. Somewhere during the seventh year it was pronounced clinically dead.



The object is not to see how long we can go without shriveling in our personal prayer life, rather we should be taking an example from Psalm 1:1-3.



Blessed is the man that walketh not in the counsel of the ungodly, nor sitteth in the seat of the scornful. But his delight is in the law of the Lord; and in his law doth he meditate day and night. And he shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that bringeth forth his fruit in his season; his leaf also shall not wither; and whatsoever he doeth shall prosper.

What do we see here?

Health through nourishment and personal communion.

## **Disabled Through Imbalance**

On a tour of India a well known bible teacher spoke at a retreat attended almost entirely by missionaries. Most of those present were suffering from fatigue and burn-out. 75% confessed to having no regular devotional life.

#### STUDY 2

In our previous study we were considering the priority of prayer. The cultivation of a daily prayer life is of vital importance

Remember; "Daily" is a discipleship word.

Our objective is to become disciples in deed.

Have we neglected our prayer life? Then we need to take positive steps towards rebuilding.

Here are <u>five steps</u> towards rebuilding our prayer life:



- 1) Make an honest confession to Jesus that you have failed Him in the place of prayer Read 1 John 1:9 in this regard
- 2) Resolve to schedule a specific time on your daily calender. Morning is usually the best time. E. Stanley Jones writes; It is best to have a quiet time "in the pure, strong hours of the morning, when the soul of the day is at its best:. Wash your thinking in the thought of Christ before you face the day.

"Every morning lean thine arm awhile
Upon the window sill of Heaven
And gaze upon they God.
Then, with the vision in thy heart,
Turn strong to meet the day"



- 3) List in a prayer diary your prayer requests or names of those for whom you are interceding.
- 4) Attend a small group or a body prayer meeting here we learn the power of agreement Matthew 18:19-20

Again I say unto you, that if two or you shall agree on earth as touching anything that they shall ask, it shall be done for them of my Father which is in Heaven. For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them.

Regarding the 4<sup>th</sup> step why not as a group on a weekly basis spend time in prayerful agreement on needs that exist within the group or that face the fellowship?


#### FINDING THE RIGHT PLACE

Having a place to pray is an important part of a daily prayer life. To say we live in an attitude of prayer is a little to ethereal to be real.

We need to be brought down to a specific place and time where we spend time in prayer. To deny this is to get above Jesus himself who retired regularly for prayer - to the mountain, garden, etc.



"Those who say that they can live in a state of prayer without stated times for prayer will probably find themselves without both."



Since prayer is a very real form of Spiritual Warfare we need to be aware of, and able to recognize enemies that seek to prevent or hinder our prayer life.

#### **Study 3 - Effective Praying**



There is no doubt that every Christian is convinced about the power of prayer. Most Christians also wish to know more about the simplicity of prayer.

In a survey conducted on Sermons America Wants to hear by This Week Magazine, the number one choice was "How Can I Make Prayer More Effective". This should come as no surprise to us since the cry of the disciples themselves was "Lord, teach us to pray."

#### What is Effective Prayer?

Jesus prayer life is a model of effective prayer. His prayers were answered in a mighty and dramatic way.

Unanswered prayers cause problems.

They raise the question "Does God really hear?", or, "Is He really interested?"

Many Christians are afraid to specify in their praying because they are affected by the thought "What happens if God doesn't answer? I'll be proved wrong." Consequently, general prayers are prayed with the vague hope that an answer will come or something will happen.

However consider the instructions of Jesus with regard to prayer. They hold the keys to an effective prayer life.

# 1) <u>FAITH</u> Read together Mark 11:22 - 24







And Jesus answering saith unto them, "have faith in God. For verily I say unto you, that whosoever shall say unto this mountain 'be thou removed and be thou cast into the sea'; and shall not doubt in his heart, but shall believe that those things which he saith shall come to pass; he shall have whatsoever he saith. Therefore I say unto you, what things soever you desire, when ye pray, believe that ye receive them, an ye shall have them."

Notice that being 'in faith' and remaining in faith is a key to receiving answers to prayer.

## 2) PERSISTENCE







The rendering here is "ask and keep on asking" and introduces the thought of persistence. Tenacity in prayer is a vital element. Quitting because we don't appear to have an immediate answer is one of the main reasons why our prayers go unanswered. It is often easier to pay others to pray for us.

Discuss the commercializing of Christianity and its destructive effect on the western church.



#### 3) AUTHORITY



Coming to a correct understanding of who we are in Christ. That we come as sons to the Father.

Notice the authority in the Name of Jesus in John 14:13 - 14.



And whatsoever ye shall ask in My name, that will I do that the Father may be glorified in the sun.

If ye shall ask anything in my Name, I will do it.

#### 4) AGREEMENT



We have already considered Matthew 18:19 - 20. if two be agreed on anything touching the kingdom.



We need to know the power of united faith and pray in agreement. Find someone with whom you can agree.

# 5) <u>DISCERNMENT</u>



1 John 5:14



And this is the confidence that we have in Him, that if we ask anything according to His will, He heareth us.

George Mueller said that once he had become convinced of God's will in any matter, from that moment he never ceased to pray until he had the answer.

Discuss together these conditions. Use the following space for any additional insights that the Lord may give. We need to be honest and ask ourselves, "has it been God's fault that our prayers have gone unanswer3ed or can it be that we have not always met the conditions?"

We can be sure that when we meet the conditions, God will always do His part.

# Prayer Meeting

Casting down imaginations and every high thing that exalteth itself against a knowledge of God and bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ.

In conclusion, let us think on the words of a well known missionary.

The art of prayer must be learned, for reservoirs of power are at our disposal if we can learn the art. "If we can learn it" - that is the question. We would deem a person foolish who stepped up to a musical instrument and expected to produce sweet music without training and practice. The little son of a missionary bought a mouth organ, and come home in tears.

"That man cheated me. There is not 'God Save The King' in this mouth organ." We foolishly believe we can get ready made results without practice and without paying the price of prayer.

Just as God has left open certain things contingent upon the human will, and they will never be accomplished unless that will decides, so He has left open certain things contingent upon prayer - things which will never be accomplished unless we pray.



Brethren, let us pray!

Yet again Jesus in His temptation in the wilderness answered the devil in Luke 4:4;

Man shall not live by bread alone but by every word of God.

Deeper truths from the word are referred to as meat. Check 1 Corinthians 3:2 and Hebrews 5:12 - 14. The implication is clear that the word of God is spiritual food.



As well as receiving strength through prayer, we gain nourishment from the word.

DAILY INTAKE is an indispensable part of our experience - whether we are NEW BORN BABES requiring 'sincere milk' or we are MATURE SAINTS that require 'meat' - the scriptures are the source for both. We never will grow to a point where we do not need to be fed from the word of God.

#### Point to Ponder



We live in the age of the information explosion. With the mass of information that has come to mankind, there has also come the means to store, communicate and reproduce that knowledge.

It is so in the church. Today we could well 'get by' without ever reading scriptures. There is an array of teaching tapes, books, magazines, videos, christian comics, radio and TV broadcasts and cds which can be enticing substitutes for the personal study of the word.



#### **Discussion Time**

## Study 2 -Part A - The Memory

We often hear people remarking that they have poor memories, and that they forget things easily. Actually the average person has filed millions of impressions and "bytes" of information in his memory. Someone estimated that if the amount of information and knowledge stored in our memories were to be put on file it would fill a building the size of the Empire State Building. Truly the memory bank is a most amazing piece of machinery.



God expects us to use it and not allow it to go defunct.



- Understanding the process whereby memory works will help us
- < to better employ it. Rather than the concept of a cloakroom
- < where facts are stored on hooks and hangers, the memory works
- < like a chain where our powers of recall are set in motion by association.



This gives rise to an interesting thought. If our memory is enriched with the word of God - chains of truth are established that quite literally hold us to the anchor of our soul, the Lord Jesus.

#### **Discussion Time**



Discuss this idea in the light of David's statement where he writes "Thy word have I hid in my heart (commit to memory) that I might not sin against thee'

The opposite is also true. Memory can be responsible for imprisoning us to former things from which we need desperately to release.



"Remember Lot's Wife" said Jesus. We can understand why. If old thought patterns keep us enslaved to old habits, and in bondage to the enemy - what would be a powerful factor in breaking out from old thought modes?

Navigators include the following step in the process of learning scripture.

The most important time to review a verse repeatedly is right after you can repeat the whole (topic, reference, verse, reference) without making a mistake. Review the verse a minimum of once daily after that, preferably several times a day for a few days. Some people say that they cannot memorize. In reality, most people tend to have a short memory. God has given us a "forgetter" and there are some things we should forget. God has also given us the capacity to remember, but we must apply the basic principles of memory to do this. The primary principle is REVIEW. A verse is learned, partially forgotten, relearned, partially forgotten and relearned again. The relearning process takes progressively less time until forgetting is replaced by knowing.

## Study 2 Part B Meditation

Meditation is one of the forgotten arts of spiritual life. What might be the reason for the neglect of meditation?



#### **Discussion Time**

#### What is meditation?

The nearest illustration is that of our own digestive system. What our digestive system is to food - meditation is to the word. When we meditate on the word we extract from it essential truth.

Look at these scriptures. They highlight the importance of meditation.

1) Joshua 1:8 2) Psalm 1:2 3) 1 Timothy 4:15 HERE ARE SOME PROVEN STEPS TO MEDITATION



- 1) Prayerfully read the word, the word is our material for meditation.
- 2) Focus on a specific truth or verse -- in reading the word there will always be something that the Lord seeks to impress on our heart.
- 3) Quiet the mind. That's not always easy. It requires a conscious effort to settle down in God. We need to learn how to put our whole weight down in Him.
- 4) Keep focused and ask God for His illumination.
- 5) Implement. Always be ready to put into practice what is spoken to your heart.

#### Study 3 - The Word



'Logos' or 'Rhema'

There has been much reference made in recent years to 'the Logos' of God and 'the Rhema' of God.

The 'Logos" is Greek for the written word. The 'Rhema' is Greek for the spoken word - immediate living word by His spirit. The question seems to be which word carried the final authority.

#### Points to Ponder



In prelude to our discussion:

In Hebrews Chapter 4 we read,

For the Word of God is quick and powerful and sharper than any two edged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit, and of joints and marrow, and is a discernment of the thoughts and intents of the heart.

Which 'word' do we think is referred to here, the logos or rhema?

When Jesus said, 'Man shall not live by bread alone', He went on to say 'but he shall live by every word that proceedeth out of the mouth of God.'

Note that first Hes said, 'it is written', secondly He made reference to words that proceedeth from the mouth of God.

Why do we think the tense is so important in this verse?

It would appear that the securest position is a balance between the two - the rhema and the logos. The logos in one sense, becomes the foundation to the rhema.

One of Wesley's preachers said, "I get my texts and my sermons from God without studying." Wesley asked, "Does God ever give you a text you have not read?" "No," replied the preacher. Wesley added, "Then you had better read more."

Of the two great movements in the 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup> century in England, the Quaker movement laid much stress on the 'Rhema' word and the Methodist movement on the 'Logos'.

Why do you think that the Methodist movement was the more enduring?

#### HOW DO WE RECEIVE GUIDANCE FROM THE WORD?

To make major life decisions on a simple 'prompting' is dangerous.

Let's look at the story of the Harbor Lights.

The captain of a certain ship always wondered why the pilot he took on board could steer with such confidence into the harbor at night time. The pilot pointed the captain to three lights, one shone from a buoy in the mid channel, the other belonged to a beacon on the harbor wall, the third shone from his own house on the hillside. "When I see all those three lights in line I know when to make my turn and head straight for port."



So it is with us in the matter of guidance, having been prompted in a certain direction (let's call that prompting our first light). We need to add to that the two other safeguards of a specific word from the scriptures and sound counsel from a trusted friend. Three in line will give us the clear inward witness of peace in our heart.

#### **Discussion Time**



Consider together these points which form the essential steering mechanism in our lives. Rhema word, Logos word, counsel and the umpire of peace in our hearts.

#### **Assignment**



Tell of some instances of where you received special direction from God.

Finally remember, The Rhema of God will never speak anything contrary to the written word

All doctrinal error stems from incomplete understanding of the scriptures. The major cults of Jesus' day are referred to in Mark chapter 12. Who were they?

One of the most common problems that lead to error is building to narrow a base for our doctrines. Other people choose a single text and build a theory upon that text. A far broader base is needed.

All major doctrine should be built up like this.





## Point to Ponder



Remember the old adage:

A text .....
Taken out of context
Becomes a pretext.

When studying the word of God, judge the context in which the statement is given. We will then see 'truth in perspective'. Even in churches where the word of God is held to be inerrant and supreme - different emphases can lead to imbalance. Where this has occurred, different factions of the Body of Christ have resulted.

#### **Discussion Time**



Major denominations in the worldwide church have their roots in scripture.

How do we view other denominations?
Is perfect agreement on scripture among all Christians possible or even desirable?
At what point must we separate from other believers because of doctrinal belief?

Are those winds of doctrine necessarily heresies, or could they be the latest fashionable teaching blowing through the land?


The goal is given in Ephesians 4:13 >>>> A perfect man in full stature.

#### THE IMPORTANCE OF BALANCE

In 2 Timothy 2:15 Paul writes, "Study to show thyself approved. A workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."

It is clear that knowing the word of truth (the scriptures) is insufficient. We must know how to correctly divide the word. This will keep us from overbalance, and from being blown about by the winds of doctrine.

# Fellowship



The Greek word *Koinonia* means - the communion - the fellowship and participation with Christ in His sufferings, in the Gifts and Graces of the Holy Spirit in this life, and in the glories of the Kingdom in the next.

The word 'Koinonia' directs our thoughts to the corporate nature of the church.

No man can achieve that goal given in Ephesians 4:13 without being in fellowship with other Christians for the prevailing truth is that we all come to this place together.

#### Reading



Ephesian is the epistle that speaks particularly of the corporate nature of the church.

In each case the thought is of the importance of each member to the other members. And of the rest of the body being indispensable to the individual member for his growth, his correct development, for his protection and for the ultimate fulfillment of God's purpose in his life.

# Notice there is never any place for a member being isolated from the Body of Christ.

As all the organs and members of our own body function and relate together so it must be with the 'Koinonia' of Christ. Every member is important. There are no atrophied or defunct members.



#### Point to Ponder



Several years ago the medical profession pronounced the appendix as a useless part of the anatomy. The tonsils and adenoids were not considered to be of much use either. The tendency was to remove them at the first signs of a problem. Now it is known that the appendix excretes an oily substance that lubricates the lower bowel and helps prevent constipation. The tonsils are the third line of defense against throat infections. God has created nothing in our bodies without purpose and every member of the Body of Christ is likewise important.

1 Corinthians 12 speaks of the Body of Christ *functionally*. It is the 'how' of the church. Ephesians 2 speaks of the Body of Christ *positionally*, for example, where we are in Christ. Because the emphasis is on position - preposition (words denoting position) are important.

Underline the prepositions in this passage and discuss the significance of these words to ourselves as members of the Body of Christ.

- 20. Which he wrought in Christ, when he raised him from the dead, and set him at his own right hand in the heavenly places.
- 21. Far above all principality, and power, and might, and dominion, and every name that is named, not only in this world, but also in that which is to come:
- 22. And hath put all things under his feet, and gave him to be the head over all things to the church,
- 23. Which is his body, the fullness of him that filleth all in all.

Clearly whatever is happening in the Koinonia of Christ is not just happening to one or two 'special' members. It is happening to us all - together.

This week read through the book of Ephesians and meditate on the three different revelations of the church. There is a fourth revelation that is spoken about in the fifth chapter. What is it?

#### Study 2 - Fellowship

We are concerned that new members who attend our fellowship, not only attend but also are 'added'. Understanding the process of integration is important for us all - all of us are part of the answer to growth, both spiritual and numerical. We are probably familiar with the church-pinball illustration where new members find it difficult to integrate with the existing structure. This is what can, and does happen.



Instead of assimilation there is a series of rebounds until eventually the person leaves by the back door. We need to understand that a person entering in a new body does not automatically feel at home or accepted. In fact it is possible that instead of a message of acceptance, signals of rejection may be given, unintentionally by the host body.

We are learning something of the nature of the process in modern medicine where transplant operations are performed.

Although the host body needs the new organ in order to survive and the new organ also needs a host body to be useful, there is not an immediate assimilation. The host body gives 'unfriendly' signals to the new organ - saying something like this ... "I don't recognize you as being part of me." "You are strange" "My system does not relate to you - it doesn't see you as 'self'."



Immuno synthetic drugs block that signal and prevent rejection until a period of time takes place when the organ is fitted in and functioning.

As we can see the experience of moving together in close committed relationships is not an ideological theoretical exercises - it is very much a down to planet earth, daily walk involving a range of situations that can be joyful and satisfying or heavy and traumatic.

#### Hanging in with the Body

The temptation when things become heavy in our relationship together is to check our or bale out and find somewhere less demanding. To do so is probably the worst possible reaction if we wish to press on to that stature in Christ already referred to in Ephesians 4:12.

If we check out of the 'Koinonia' of Christ we immediately come under the power of a different law. What scientists call the law of entropy which simply says:



# Everything in the cosmic system tends to disintegration - it is losing energy and falling apart.

However consider the first statement made by Jesus concerning his church.

Matthew 16:18. I will build my church and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it.

Put another way this could read, "I will build my church and the law of destruction from hell shall not affect it".

Which law do we want to be under the power of? It's our choice.

#### Study 4 - Walking in the Light

Earlier we looked at he word 'together' in the Ephesian epistle, how we were raised together, made to sit together, how we were being built together. In John 1, the word speaks about walking together.

If we walk in the light as He is in the light we have fellowship one with another and the blood of Jesus Christ, His son, cleanseth us from all sin.



On the face of it, that sounds easy but nothing in our walk is easy, though God intends everything to be simple.

#### **Discussion Time**



Discuss the difference between simple and easy. What is the light that we are to walk in?

Clearly the reference is to an openness and honesty in relationship that from time to time will involve offense being given to another brother or sister and forgiveness being offered; of hurts being sustained and repentance being made; of relationships that are real enough and strong enough and secure enough to endure the test and pressures that come from daily living in a fallen world.

Charles Simpson gave an illustration of molecules and cells in a living organism, how they always produce toxins as a waste product of life. He wisely observed that since the body of Christ is organic in structure, the normal business of living produces toxins between members that need to be purged away, in order that healthy function can continue.

Walking in the light, allows the blood of Christ to flow - the arterial system of Christs body, carry away from the members the wast products of relationship, so our fellowship with each other can remain clean and updated.



As the final days approach us Jesus there would be cataclysms in the earth - earthquakes, famine, etc. But there will also be convulsions in society which means in individual families and in personal lives.
