## **Avoid Common Mistakes**





Crate!

#### Prep your crate

- Reinforce your crate before bringing your dog home
- Place zip ties on all corners, sides, top, and bottom.
- Place Carabiner clips at top, middle, and bottom of the door



# Using a Crate



- Allows your dog to decompress
- Helps you teach your dog the house rules/routine
- Prevents chewed furniture and walls
- Prevents potty accidents
- Helps your new dog learn his place
- Prevents dog fights
- Prevents <u>Escape</u>


### Be Smart From the Start



# Walk your new dog <u>BEFORE</u> going into the home.



Enter your home with dog <u>on leash</u>, briefly explore the home, give water and lead straight to crate. (on leash always)



# Decompression When you get me home. Please let me relax for a bit. I love you.

#### Decompress (first few weeks) ро нот ехрест тоо мисн, ро нот give тоо мисн

- Allow your new dog to <u>Smell, Hear, and See</u> his new life without expecting him to LIVE his new life.
- Crate should be in an area where your new dog can <u>smell and hear</u> what is going on, but not right in the middle of things.



## **Establish Routine**

#### (always on leash, if out of crate)



 After some time in crate, feed him and take him (on leash) to the door you will expect him to use to go potty, go out to potty




2. Come back indoors and spend a brief, calm, controlled, and leashed "out of crate" time.
NO couch, NO rough play, NO cuddles and kissy play, NO free roam.






# 3. Then back outside (same door) for potty... then back in crate

#### Using a crate sets you and your new dog up for SUCCESS! **Protect your dog, protect your home**



## **Preventing Escape**

Flat collars should be used for ID tags only. Not safe to attach to leash

Use a martingale collar or secure slip lead so your dog cannot "back out" of collar



# Do NOT use Flat Collars for Leash

## If he decided to back up and slip out, he will do it!



If she tries to back up and slip out, her martingale collar will tighten



# A strong, sturdy slip lead with a catch is safe and secure for all dogs





## Use Gates at Doorways

- A new dog will be afraid and may want to escape
- Protect your new dog by placing baby gates at any doorway that leads to an unfenced outdoor area
- Use baby gates to keep your new dog confined to a supervised area of your home



### GATE!!

#### Be responsible with outdoor gates!

- Make sure your gate is tall enough, sturdy, and has a strong latch
- NEVER trust that your gate is closed (check every time you let your dog(s) out in the yard)
- Know your gardener's/pool man's schedule and check to make sure gate has been securely closed and latched when they leave



## Be Safe, Be Responsible





Wait!



- Allow your dog time to decompress, adjust, and learn the house rules/routine
- A new dog should spend the majority of their first weeks in a crate and only out for potty breaks and supervised (leashed) limited exploration.
- NO walks, NO unnecessary car rides, NO visits with friends, NO trips to Petco, NO dog parks

# WAIT!

(introducing to your established dogs)

- 1. Smell before see
- 2. See before touch

(walk before introducing)

1. No Nose to Nose



### Introducing Dogs

<u>Smell Before See:</u> (Allow your dogs to smell each other's scent first) This can be done on your blankets and clothing



#### See Before Touch

Walk dogs: (Dog – Person – Person – Dog) Keep Dogs Moving With NO Direct Contact



#### **NO Nose to Nose**

#### Do not allow your dogs to socialize Nose to Nose until you learn to read their body language
