#### The Lord and Master vs. "The Masters"

For any of you golf enthusiast out there, you know that this weekend there is a gathering of the sports elite in Augusta, Georgia. They will be playing a competition at the prestigious Augusta National Golf Course, one of the most beautiful venues in all sports. The golfers will compete for the coveted prize of the "Green Jacket" given to the champion. Although some people may disagree with me, the tournament is NOT a religious experience, but there are some "church-y" references and connections: the Masters is normally played on or around Easter Sunday, there is a portion of the course called "amen" corner, and, it is believed that some of the most famous golf shots took a little bit of skill and Divine Intervention!

Interestingly enough, in 2020 the Masters golf weekend corresponds with the Gospel reading using the language of "the Master" connecting with God. Like the golfers in Augusta, the servants in the Gospel have been given great gifts and talents. Our culture has lifted up most athletic competition and placed it on a sacred level. Think of how we respond to the Super Bowl, the Kentucky Derby, the World Cup, the Final Four, and NASCAR racing. There is almost a liturgical approach in the way people dress, the cheers and chants they make, the food and beverages they consume, and how people block off their calendars to make time in order to be present at the event. We can even look at how we make athletes godlike. Sports has become the modern-day religion.

It is unlikely we will have the same crowds in our beautiful church here in Seaford as they do at Yankee Stadium or other sporting arenas, but what we gather for allows us to acknowledge and celebrate our God-given gifts. God's expectations are high, and we will be accountable whether we celebrate his gifts to us or if we choose to bury our talents. The golfer will be judged on the scale and accuracy of hitting a ball closest to the pin - for us it is different. How has God invited you to share your time, talent, and treasure? In the "big things," like loving your spouse and family, getting to Sunday Mass (or watching it), being attentive and aware of the poor and vulnerable. And how about with the "small things," like our daily prayer, acts of kindness and generosity, or simply being a catalyst of the "Master's" joy with a smile or greeting someone. These are the ways that we show God what we have done with the gifts he has given to us, and how we give them back to him and others.

When we are faithful in small matters, the Master will trust us with greater responsibilities. In a world desperate for Christian joy, hope, and love we must be the beacons of that light and faith to everyone we meet. For those who have been given great things, more will be given, and more will also be demanded. Let us be faithful servants to the "true Master!"

#### A few more questions:

Father Joe, can you address the four-sided UFO hanging above the altar? Are those speakers that will be functioning when the new sound system is complete?

Be at peace, we are not being invaded by Mars, or a Close Encounters of the Third Kind. The large structure hanging above the sanctuary is four lights that at one time worked and illuminated the ceiling space above the altar. I have connected with a few members of the Pastoral Council, as well as our Buildings and Grounds Committee and we would likely remove those non-working lights in the future. We have also begun preliminary discussions about addressing those lights and a few other structural projects as we draw closer to the 95th and 100th anniversary of the church. But as of now we are not prepared to begin any projects.

You had mentioned Advent and Christmas approaching, I was at the 4:00 PM Christmas Eve Mass last year in the school with my family and about 900 other parishioners. What measures are you taking to assure we can get as many people as possible to Mass for this Christmas?

This is the question I probably pray about the most. I am in dialogue with the staff, Pastoral Council, and volunteers, and we hope to present the safest and most prayerful experience for Christmas 2020. I hope to release a modified schedule that will accommodate as many parishioners who feel comfortable enough to enter the Church and as many open spaces around the campus as we possibly can. Fr. James, Fr. Collins and I are committed to say as many Masses as we can. Along with technology and Livestreaming I feel we will have a beautiful Christmas Worship experience. We are going to be wise, safe, and patient, and the Lord will take care of the rest!

#### **Faith Formation**

"Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you. - Matthew: 28: 19-20

Jesus commanded his disciples go and make disciples. By virtue of our own Baptism, we, too, are called to make disciples. Most of us will not be called to travel to all nations to spread the good news, but we are called to make disciples in our homes, schools, neighborhoods, and workplaces. As Saint Francis de Sales said, "bloom where you are planted... for the love of God has been poured into our hearts by His Spirit dwelling in each one of us."

Our students and their families came to our Parent/Child Sessions throughout this past week. The theme for these sessions was about one of the Church's greatest mysteries: The Holy Trinity; three Divine Persons in one God. Our students and their families learned that love is the answer to the mystery of the Trinity and our Triune God is a model for the connections, affection, and bonds we can make with one another. Families, schools, and groups of friends can mirror the unity of the Trinity.

Our younger students were shown examples from nature such as water, an apple, and a blanket to help them visualize and grasp the mystery of One God, three persons. Fr. Joe played his guitar and taught them a song. The parents and their children were engaged throughout the session. Our older students were given some instruction on the importance of modeling their relationships after the Trinity and learned that Christian love is a daily choice, not a feeling. Fr. Joe then led everyone in Adoration. The sessions were very powerful and prayerful, giving people the opportunity to just be with God. Love was felt all around, truly the Holy Trinity was present!






## Saint Leo the Great
