“Pray, Hope, and Don’t Worry”

Those words are familiar to so many Catholics as the Mantra of Saint Pius of Pietrelcina, whose feast day we celebrate this week (September 23). The life of Padre Pio was filled with prayer and suffering; suffering united to the cross of Jesus. He was gifted with the stigmata, a physical condition that causes a person to exhibit the physical wounds of Jesus to their body. These people’s hands, feet, forehead, side, and back develop the same wounds suffered by Jesus at the time of the crucifixion. This phenomenon has happened to faithful disciples who have been both blessed and burdened to unite their suffering to Christ’s on the cross.

The Parish of Saint William the Abbot has held a strong devotion to Padre Pio, and the statue and shrine on our campus has served and continues to serve as a beacon of prayer and hope during the COVID-19 Pandemic. This quiet, humble, Italian priest has served as a bridge and doorway with so many people in the history of the church, those who are faithful, and those not as connected to their Catholic faith. Saint Pio has been dead over 50 years, and continues to inspire and bring people into relationship with Christ and the church.

I have had wonderful and thought-provoking conversations with Christians who at times have challenged me, and the teachings of the Church about Saints, shrines, and devotions. They often ask, “why not go with a direct line to Jesus?” God is so good and is able to do and use just about anything to attract people to Himself, such as a young Jewish girl from Nazareth, an imposing Roman torture tool, and even a simple priest from South-Central Italy. Jesus Christ is our Lord and Savior and a relationship with him is the way to salvation and eternal life. That relationship happens within the context of the Church and all of its wonder, beauty, and at times dysfunction.

If you are like me, there have been seasons in your life when you did not feel worthy or deserving of God’s love. So perhaps it took a random scripture verse, or a story of the life of a saint, or even a medal, cross or rosary beads to reconnect you with Christ and the church. Maybe it was praying a particular devotion, such as the rosary, daily mass, or a novena prayer that in its discipline and repetition helped you stay grounded and faithful. These are the gifts of the church. Yes, Jesus is the Way, the Truth, and Life, but God allows sacramentals to help us.

As a Parish community, we have had long-standing devotions that were put on pause during the Pandemic, and our hope is to reignite some of them in the next few weeks. Daily Eucharistic Adoration, Confession, and Rosary, the Saint Peregrine Cancer Prayer Group, Miraculous Medal Novena, and quiet personal prayer before and after Mass. I am so grateful for your flexibility and cooperation as we navigate these strange times. Safety and cleanliness are still our top priority. Each day our task force cleans after mass, and our deep cleaning service comes in to disinfect around 1:00 PM. In October, except when there are funerals following the 8:30 Mass, the Church will remain open until 12 PM – for individual prayer.

Although we have adjusted certain protocols, methods and expectations, the Lord has remained present in our community. We have kept Christ at the Center of the St. William the Abbot Family. The hope over these next few months is in many ways to build on the foundation that has been long established here. Our focus will be on celebrating the Sacraments really well; our focus will be on forming and educating the faithful; and our focus will be reaching out to the most vulnerable in the community. The past six months have been challenging. We are actually re-learning certain aspects of church, liturgical movements, and “how to” do ministry post corona virus. However, what has remained constant is the love God has for each of us. In our almost 100-year history, Saint William the Abbot Church has stood as a rock of strength through World Wars, financial booms and busts, political highs and lows, 9/11 terrorist attacks, and even a global pandemic. We make it through those difficulties with God at the Center, a focus on our families, and the simple mantra of Padre Pio. Pray, Hope, and Don’t Worry!

Faith Formation

In a little over a week, Faith Formation will begin for our students and their families. Dates for Parent Meetings and Parent/Child Meetings have been sent out to all registered families. Three different sessions are being offered per grade level. Families are not locked into a time and day of the week. They can choose the session each month that works best with their schedule. Parents will come every other month by themselves and the following month they will come with their child/ren. The meetings are being held to help the parents catechize their child and parent/child sessions are scheduled to supplement what is being taught in the home. These sessions will consist of teaching, activities, Adoration, and the celebration of Mass.



What is RCIA?

RCIA stands for the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, and it is the process by which unbaptized adults become Catholic. It is also the way those baptized in other Christian faiths to enter into full communion with the Church by receiving Communion and Confirmation, or for baptized Catholics to complete these sacraments if they haven't already.

How long does it take to become Catholic?

There is not a one size fits all answer to that question. Adult baptisms for Catechumens usually take place at the Easter Vigil, the night before Easter Sunday. Ideally the process would last most of a year or longer depending on the situation. For a baptized Christian of another faith community, the process could proceed rather quickly, only a few months, or longer depending on their own formation and participation in their present faith community. For Catholics who are missing sacraments the process can take a few months or longer.

Why is it important for a baptized Catholic to complete their sacraments?

Baptism is the entryway into life with Christ, but no one is fully initiated until they receive Confirmation and Eucharist. Confirmation is also needed in order to become a Godparent or Confirmation sponsor, or for marriage to another Catholic with a few exceptions. Eucharist is the summit and source of our faith, and if we can't receive it we are missing out on the graces we receive through Holy Communion.

Are their tests or homework?

The simple answer is no! However we encourage Catechumens and Candidates to read and explore things on their own, to keep a journal of their thoughts, insights and questions, and to talk things over with sponsors. Of course we expect them to attend Sunday Mass with the parish community and get involved.

Can you become Catholic if you are divorced?

Yes, but with caveats. It depends on the situation of the previous marriage, and that of the current spouse, if there is one. Some marriage situations are easy to rectify and some take a bit longer. Marriage situations do not preclude candidates from attending sessions to prepare to enter the Church. One of our priests will assist the candidate in this regard.

What are these rituals?

There are a number of rituals that occur at a Sunday Mass. These are steps, so to speak, to enter the Church. They are public rites, and the parish community prays with the Catechumens and candidates at this time. For those who will be baptized at Easter, they will come together.

How much does all this cost?

One of the best things about RCIA is that it is FREE!

I am already Catholic, why should I know about RCIA?

We all may know family members or friends who are not Catholic but may have shown some interest in our faith, or those who have not completed their sacraments. As Catholics we are called, by Christ, to share the Good News with others. This might mean making suggestions to others that they explore Catholicism. If you know about RCIA you can let them know about it and how to go about getting started.

What does Catechumen mean?

There are a lot of churchy words in RCIA. A Catechumen is a person preparing for Baptism. It is an ancient term meaning one who receives instruction by word of mouth. A candidate is someone from another Christian faith or a Catholic preparing for Confirmation. There are other words that are learned as the person goes along in the process.

What do RCIA sessions look like?

Sessions are usually held once a month on Sunday after Mass. We meet, discuss the Sunday scriptures, and then have a presentation on Catholic teachings. Sessions are informal and are not classes but faith sharing and exploration of our relationship with Christ, always striving to go deeper into that relationship with God and the Parish community. Our textbook is the Bible, videos, and other materials exploring the Catholic faith.

What is a sponsor?

A sponsor is someone who accompanies a person on their RCIA journey. Sponsors are usually from the parish community, but sponsors may be chosen by the person if the sponsor is a practicing Catholic who has received all their sacraments of Initiation and is in good standing with the Church. A Catechumen may also choose Godparents in addition to a sponsor.

Can children be in RCIA?


RCIA sessions are geared for adults. However children do take part in certain rituals that are part of the process. They are usually catechized through the parish school or faith formation. In cases with older children or teens, there may be specific sessions set up for them and their parents.

Can I accompany someone to RCIA sessions?


Of course! Many Catholics who join a relative or friend at sessions find that they learn things about the Catholic faith that they did not know before. It also gives the Catechumen or Candidate someone else to discuss things with after the sessions.

How does someone get started in RCIA?


