FoFF and Lakeside Team up to Complete Basketball Court and Hoop Project

Check out Friends of Fort Flagler's latest addition to the park! What was an ugly slab of concrete built in WWII as a place to wash vehicles has been transformed into a first-class basketball court and hoop. FoFF volunteers contributed more than 60 hours of time, prepping the cracked and weed-infested concrete, pouring a massive concrete base for the new hoop and erecting it on the site. Vigo Anderson, FoFF Board member, was the driving force



behind this project. A big thank you to him and the cadre of volunteers that made this happen.

Lakeside Industries, led by project manager Mike Pinell, did a fabulous job paving the court with asphalt, tending to this small project with all the care that they would show paving a major highway. And the icing on the cake is that Lakeside is donating \$2,500 toward the cost of the project. Thank you!

Already the court is attracting good use. We know that it will be one of those things that enhances the park experience for youth groups and families.







Fort Flagler Being Considered for Major Capital Investment

Fort Flagler is literally #1 on the list of State funded capital projects! At its July meeting the Washington State Parks and Recreation Commission included five projects for our park on the statewide list of projects for potential funding in the upcoming biennial budget (July 2021 to June 2023). The list now goes to Governor Inslee who will submit his proposal for consideration in the next legislative session that begins in January.

In order of priority set by the Commission, the projects are:

- \$850,000 to re-route the road in the upper campground that is becoming perilously close to the eroding adjacent bluff.
- \$1,963,000 to complete the renovations to the pre-WWI Historic Facilities (currently underway).
- \$915,000 for a new Welcome Center to be located near the entrance of the park.
- \$750,000 for replacement of aging restrooms in the lower campground.
- \$200,000 to kick off renovations to the WWII theater, a long-standing priority for FoFF.

We will continue to push for funding of these projects, especially the Welcome Center and the WWII theater renovation. As those that have followed FoFF activities for some time, you know that the theater



has long been a project on our list. It's great to see it as part of the official WSP request, even though it is not for the full cost and it is quite low on the priority list.

FoFF is delighted that the Welcome Center is on the list with a good chance of being funded. It would replace the little station in the road on the way to the campgrounds, and would greet park visitors near the true entrance of the park and offer them a proper orientation. We'll push hard for it!

Friends of Fort Flagler has already been very active in advocating for the investments to the park, including offering testimony to the Parks Commission and meeting early this year with our elected officials from the 24th legislative district.

On October 5th we had a fabulous meeting with Representative Steve Tharinger, a great supporter of the park and in a key role in the legislature as chair of the House committee that oversees the capital budget.




