The Tomahawk seeks to reflect the Vision and Purpose of Alpha Sigma Phi by presenting news of active chapters, affiliate organizations, individual members and the Fraternity; by addressing current issues facing the Greek community and our Fraternity; by educating and entertaining those interested in the welfare of Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity and by serving as a historical record.

Alpha Sigma Phi Fraternity, Inc., was founded at Yale University in 1845 and currently recognizes 179 chapters, provisional chapters and interest groups across the world. The Fraternity aims to be the co-curricular and continuing organization of choice.

POSTMASTER

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from the Grand Senior President



First, I hope everyone reading this edition of *The Tomahawk* is healthy and that you and your family have been safe and minimally impacted by the events of 2020. Since being elected Grand Senior President, I have been asked by many brothers how our fraternity is doing in light of the current issues in North America.

Membership - Generally, most of our members returned to school this fall, albeit some virtually. Recruitment numbers are trending positively, and we will likely achieve our fall goal. We are seeing on average our chapters recruit one fewer man this fall, compared to last, although some chapters have done very well and exceeded their total new members from last year. Now, more than ever, we need positive mentors for our members and chapters. In this virtual environment, the opportunities to coach and guide undergraduate officers in your chapter, or a chapter near you, has never been easier. Please contact Fraternity Headquarters (tbtm@alphasig.org) if you are able to volunteer a few hours a month.

Housing - All houses owned or managed by CLVEN are open with residents this fall. Most houses are filled to capacity and less than 15 men that signed lease agreements elected not to live in the chapter facility this year (out of nearly 1,200 residents). CLVEN developed house-specific COVID protocols

and communicated with chapter leadership the guidelines and expectations for this academic year. While there have been some COVID positive tests and some facilities that have been quarantined for a period of time, Alpha Sigs are being safe and making responsible decisions.

Leadership Programs – Plans are underway to have leadership programming and officer training virtually next year. The Headquarters Staff is using this time to repurpose how we train and develop our chapter leaders which focuses on creating a cohort feel and more ongoing education for our chapter leaders. In the meantime, the new website, alphasig.org, has many online resources and videos to help chapter officers navigate this new environment.

Strategic Plan – As the 2020 Strategic Plan comes to a close, all three Boards (Grand Council, Foundation Board, and CLVEN) approved a 2025 Strategic Plan. This would be the first strategic plan for the Foundation and CLVEN and the first time all three organizations demonstrated this level of collaboration and alignment. The three priorities for the Fraternity Strategic Plan are: Brotherhood Perpetuation (focused on helping chapters recruit and retain more members); Undergraduate Achievement (focus on academics, health and safety, and leadership development); and Lifetime Engagement (focus on chapter-based Alumni Associations and the transition from undergraduate to alumnus).

Foundation Support – The Foundation Board granted an additional \$50,000 (beyond the traditional grant to the Fraternity) for COVID-relief scholarships. 106 members in need received a \$500 scholarship this fall, thanks to the generosity of our donors and the support of the Foundation Board. This additional grant, along with the traditional grant to the Fraternity, can only happen with the support of alumni. The reality is brothers like you, who read our magazine, are the most active and committed men in our fraternity. If you are reading this, now, more than ever, we need your support at whatever amount you are comfortable. Please take a minute and visit aspgiving.org and make your annual tax-deductible gift, as part of our Founders Day Challenge, to help our younger brothers.

The idea that Alpha Sigma Phi provides a lifetime of brotherhood may be cliché, but it's undoubtedly accurate. The Alpha Nu Chapter at Westminster College was founded in 1939. Of the 64 men initiated into the Chapter in its first year of operation, five men are alive today. One of those men is Russ Dahlburg, USAR Ret., Westminster '39, who virtually attended the Chapter's Homecoming Reunion on Zoom in early October.

Brother Dahlburg has always been proud to be an Alpha Sig. A major reason his pride in the Old Gal has lasted 81 years and counting is because of the everlasting connections he's made with his brothers; one brother in particular.


Dr. Joseph Hopkins, Westminster '39, Omega '19 passed away last fall. He joined the Alpha Nu Chapter a well-groomed, elegant, warm-hearted and musically inclined young man. He and Brother Dahlburg would cross paths at Westminster College and then become brothers for life, remaining close friends over many years that typically draw people further apart over time.

Both men led successful lives, raised loving families, and incredibly, lived to be 100 years of age, all while staying connected through their origins at the Alpha Nu Chapter of Alpha Sigma Phi over eight decades ago.

In a letter written by Brother Dahlburg's son to Brother Hopkins' daughter upon her father's passing, Theo wrote:

"What is most touching is that the essence of the two teenagers never changed, their deep personal bond endured, and some of their most cherished memories harken back to their Westminster College days and the spontaneous gatherings around the piano in the fraternity house. To this day, just utter the name, "Joe Hopkins" and watch Russ' face immediately light up. It's like he becomes 17 years old again. His facial expressions and words reveal all; namely, that deeply in his heart, over the course of his long life, one of Russ' greatest blessings was to meet Joe ... and call him friend and brother."

This past January, they had the honor of attending an international Boy Scouting event in Foz do Iguaçu, Brazil called "JamCam."

This annual event is meant to connect people of differing origins, languages, beliefs, enviroments, cultures and genders. It is aimed to strengthen the bond of Scout values and to promote the qualities of diversity.

AN UNCONVENTIONAL REUNION

The alumni brothers of the Beta Theta Chapter at Rutgers gather each year for their fall reunion. Unfortunately, due to the ongoing pandemic, and like most things these days, their 2020 reunion had to happen virtually. Though the brothers were not able to enjoy a typical reunion, they were still able to reconnect and further their brotherhood bonds. Thirty-three brothers tuned in via Zoom for three hours of reminiscing, updating and catching up. Brother Mike Blasi, Rutgers '65, was encouraged by the turnout. "The brothers are committed for 2021 to better support the Chapter, as several men have joined the alumni board and have offered to help in all ways possible," he said. "We hope to gather again in person next year!"





Alpha Sigma Phi made unprecedented strides over the last decade, largely in part because of an ambitious 2020 Strategic Plan constructed in 2013 that would take the Old Gal to our 175th Anniversary.

The plan was a continuation of our first Strategic Plan, developed under the leadership of our 37th Grand Senior President, Mark Still, Washington '75, and the prioritization was established by our 38th Grand Senior President, Rich Ritter, Toledo '91, in 2008.

At the time the Fraternity began its strategic planning, it had just 60 chapters and colonies (now called provisional chapters) and around 2,000 undergraduate men across the United States.

The following is an excerpt from the Spring 2010 editon of the Tomahawk Magazine:

"Imagine Alpha Sigma Phi with 180 chapters and colonies, a number that by today's measures would crack the top ten of largest fraternities. Imagine almost 7,000 undergraduate men sharing our values, almost triple the number we have now. Imagine having concentrated pockets of chapters that can easily visit and support each other not only in the Midwest and Northeast, but also in the Southeast, Florida, Texas, California and the Pacific Northwest. It's not that such imaginings haven't happened before, but this time it may be for real."

What was once in our imagination is now nearly an exact, if not better, reality. A vision that dates back more than ten years, 20 academic semesters and 3,500 total days, Alpha Sigma Phi has 179 chapters/ provisional chapters and nearly 8,000 undergraduate members.

The 2025 Strategic Plan is the first in our history that all three entities of Alpha Sigma Phi (Fraternity, Foundation and CLVEN) have their own priorities and objectives. This process began after the election of our 41st Grand Senior President, Jeff Hoffman, Member-at-Large '76.

Our fraternity has enjoyed a Golden Era of growth thanks to a strategic vision and dedicated staff and alumni. So, what's next for our great brotherhood?

We believe that all people are created equal and should have the right to be treated the same no matter their ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation or race.

The value of such inclusiveness has never been greater given the rich diversity of our campuses and communities. Where inclusiveness is not about diversity for the sake of political correctness, but where inclusiveness is a values-based choice, a decision made because it is the right decision to make based on who we say we are as a brotherhood of men.

Alpha Sigma Phi abolished discrimination based on ethnic or religious criteria at the National Convention in 1950 (Niagara Falls, Ontario) and supports equal treatment among men. We are working actively to promote cultural, religious and racial diversity in our memberships and to oppose acts of racism.

While the core values, tenants and ideals remain the same, our Fraternity looks different today than it did 175 years ago. Our membership and our staff reflect the rich diversity of our Brotherhood.

Our work was not done at that point. It is the responsibility of the Fraternity to continue to evolve with society. In response to the social justice movement, the Fraternity facilitated three online events:

- A DISCUSSION TO SPEAK ABOUT CURRENT EVENTS, PERSONAL
 IDENTITIES AS A BLACK MAN, AND
 ALLOW BROTHERS A SPACE TO
 PROCESS WITH OTHER BROTHERS
- A DISCUSSION ON OUR ROLE AS ALLIES AND BROTHERS WHO WANT TO ACTIVELY PARTICIPATE IN THIS MOVEMENT
- AN EDUCATION SESSION ON PROGRAMMING AND PRACTICES THAT A CHAPTER CAN ADOPT TO ADDRESS RACISM AND INCLUSIVITY

THIS IS OUR TIME TO BETTER THE WORLD THROUGH BETTER MEN. AT A TIME WHEN MANY OF US ARE AT A LOSS FOR WORDS, OUR POSITION STATEMENT ON RACISM THAT WAS ADOPTED AT THE 41ST GRAND CHAPTER IN 1990 RESONATES MORE TODAY THAN EVER.

During that last presentation, the Fraternity offered programming guidance to its chapters to address racism and to promote inclusion. What can our chapters do to be actively anti-racist?

- Host a Chapter Meeting to discuss how your chapter wants to address racism. Define what "take a stand" means to you.
- Appoint a chapter officer whose responsibilities are inclusion and diversity.
- Invite the campus Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion staff to your chapter meeting.
- Have a conversation with your membership. Remind them the impact of their words and their actions.
- Plan a discussion after your first chapter meeting and discuss ways in which the Chapter and Brothers have benefitted from white privilege.
- Research campus events hosted by the College/University or other student groups on how you can both show support as well as activism.
- Evaluate your recruitment strategies to ensure your process is inclusive.
- Donate to causes that our members personally identify with that have the ability to make a difference.
- Offer continuing Brother education for members that provide incentives to program that address racial injustice.

Partner with a Black student organization on acampus event.


Host a letter writing campaign to your local citygovernment to require body cameras on police

officers.

Ask each Brother to identify 1 anti-racist commitment that they will embody.

Host "Truth Talks" to create a safe space to discuss race,
 racism, ethnicity, culture, creed, religion and sexual identity.

- Have your members take an Implicit Bias Test to discover hidden cognitive biases and how they impact everyday actions.
- Invite an National Pan-Hellenic Council chapter to share ways that Alpha Sigma Phi could use their power and privilege as an organization to help the Black Greeks.
- Review your recruitment and finance policy and identify where the Chapter is creating barriers to men from joining.



- Coordinate time to reflect during your next chapter meeting.
- Sponsor a speaker for Black History Month.
- Evaluate all social event themes to ensure they are not racist or offensive.
- Stop any events that have themes rooted in racial injustice, such as Brother auctions.
- Monitor your GroupMe/group text thread to immediately call out racist comments/jokes.
- Ask your Fraternity/Sorority Advisor to come to a chapter meeting to discuss the similarities and differences between the fraternities and sororities in each governing
 council.
- Examine your chapter leadership and ensure it's reflective of the demographic of your campus.
- Actively support grassroots initiatives that you see on campus.

Our Chapters are also doing the work every day to create a diverse and inclusive environment. Our lota Chi Chapter at California Polytechnic Institute created the position of Vice President of Diversity and Inclusion. To learn more about this position, please contact Fraternity Staff.




Byron Hughes, Salisbury '06 said in a recent Fraternity webinar "Many people say, "I don't see color." But color does exist in our Brotherhood. 


POLITICS & BROTHERHOOD

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





THE **POSITIVE EFFECTS** of fraternity membership

Renowned education researcher and professor at Indiana University, <u>Gary Pike</u>, has conducted a study of student engagement utilizing one of the largest sample sizes of Greek versus non-affiliated students ever undertaken. As shared at the Foundation for Fraternal Excellence conference held virtually over the summer, the study used data from the 2014 and 2017 administrations of the National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE), drawing on responses from more than 200,000 students attending 541 institutions.

Key findings include:

Fraternity/Sorority members are more likely to be involved and engaged on their college campuses.

Fraternity/Sorority members had significantly higher levels of student engagement in educationally purposeful activities and more frequent participation in high-impact practices such as participating in a learning community, an internship/co-op or study abroad programs, among others.

Fraternity/Sorority members are more likely to be satisfied with their college experience, especially among incoming and graduating students.

Fraternity and sorority members reported higher levels of satisfaction than did their non-Greek peers. This was especially true for first- and fourth-year students indicating that the fraternity/sorority experience adds significantly to the university orientation experience and assists in alumni engagement following the undergraduate experience. First-year fraternity/ sorority members were especially strong on three engagement indicators: collaborative learning, student-faculty interaction, and supportive campus environment. As shared by Gary Pike, "The largest positive effects were generally found for first-year students, arguing against deferring recruitment until the second semester or second year." Fraternity/Sorority members have more discussions about diversity and engagement with diverse organizations and people on campus.

While fraternity/sorority members were more homogeneous than the general student population, fraternity/sorority members reported significantly higher levels of "Discussions with Diverse Others" than independent students, the effects of background and enrollment characteristics. This means fraternity/ sorority members are more likely than non-affiliated students to have conversations and meaningful engagement with:

- People from a race or ethnicity other than their own
- People from an economic background other than their own
- People with religious beliefs other than their own
- People with political views other than their own

Fraternity/Sorority members are more academically engaged and successful than non-members.

Fraternity/Sorority members are more likely to engage with campus academic programs and report higher grades and higher satisfaction with their academic progress and institution than are non-members.

In conclusion, Fraternity and Sorority membership has a profound positive effect on college students, getting them and keeping them engaged, satisfied and successful. Now, more than ever, we should rely on fraternities and sororities to help students engage and be successful. Advisors, members, and national leadership must continue to promote these positive impacts on students and actively work to preserve and promote fraternity and sorority membership instead of stifling it.



Scott Smith has embodied the values of Alpha Sigma Phi from the very beginning of his collegiate career. Scott was initiated into the Delta lota Chapter at Longwood University in 2002. During his time as an undergrad, Scott was the President of his chapter and the President of the campus' Interfraternity Council. Following his time at Longwood, he has continued to make an impact. In 2016, Longwood awarded him the Rotunda Outstanding Young Alumni Award and this past summer, his own chapter honored him with their local Lifetime Achievement Award. Since his graduation in 2005, Scott has clearly stayed in touch with many of his brothers and his alma mater.

When asked about staying in touch with his brothers during COVID-19, Scott explained how the shutdown was a great time to get back in touch with all of his brothers from Alpha Sigma Phi. Even though the Chapter couldn't physically meet up or hang out, there were constant phone calls and Zoom meet ups for them to retell old stories and reminisce. He said, "Delta lota has always been a breeding ground of characters and those phone calls kept me laughing and positive into the next day." While at night Scott was catching up with old friends, during the day, he was helping his community fight off the current outbreak in the Outer Banks.

When Scott and the other founders of Kill Devil Rum started planning their business in 2013, they had no idea how quickly it was going to take off. Scott met his business partners at a previous job in Kill Devil Hills. He said, "We all respected each other's work ethic and had the same passion for rum and wanted to go into business for ourselves." The guys quit their jobs in January 2014 and began renovating a building to suit their needs for the distillery. After over a year, they finally opened the doors to Outer Banks Distilling and began making Kill Devil Rum in February 2015. The first term for rum was "kill devil' and the town they live in, Kill Devil Hills, translates to rum hills. The Outer Banks is surrounded by countless shipwrecks, and during the colonial days, barrels of rum would wash ashore. Locals would hide their rum barrels in the sand dunes and the area became known as Kill Devil Hills. Being surrounded by history and with the passion of the spirit, Scott and his team wanted to bring it alive. In other words, there was no better place to start a rum distillery.

As the years went on, Kill Devil Rum became a household name on the East Coast and continues to spread. The company was 5 years in when COVID-19 hit the Outer Banks and the world, this past spring. At first, Scott said it was incredibly nerve wracking as they watched other local businesses shut down and close. They were fortunate enough to keep production open to supply demand for liquor stores but were unable to operate their retail store and bar. The Outer Banks reacted quickly and shut down the bridges in hopes of keeping the virus out of the community. At that point, the hand sanitizer in the area ran out. Scott said, "We have always made it a point to have a community-oriented business model and give back to our neighbors at every given time that it is needed. We knew we had the capabilities to make the hand sanitizer so we jumped on it."

Every store in Eastern North Carolina was out of hand sanitizer, as well as most of the country. As word spread throughout the area that they were making it, the phone never stopped ringing. People from all over the United States were reaching out to try to get some to protect their businesses and families from the pandemic. Outer Banks Distilling is a small distillery, so the team worked overtime to be able to supply the communities in their region. Scott made it very clear that they never intended on making money or selling this sanitizer. They made the decision to give it away for free and a couple of the towns bought it from them at a cost, without taking any profit. Scott said, "We couldn't sleep at night feeling like we were taking advantage of people's fears. People have always supported us since we opened, and we are always going to do our best to be a positive addition to the Outer Banks."

As the Outer Banks opened back up and supply came back in to local stores, Scott and his team were eventually able to go back in to production of their rum. The entire community was incredibly thankful for the work that the Kill Devil Rum guys did to keep everyone healthy. There was even a massive line out the door when the Distillery opened back up for business. Even though it was such a tough time, Scott was happy and proud that they were able to do something positive for everyone and explained how it really kept the whole staff positive and in strong mental health. Scott truly embodies the values of an Alpha Sig man. When asked for closing thoughts, Scott said, "Thanks to my experience as a brother of Alpha Sig, I learned management and leadership skills that I did not even know that I needed until years down the road. Without those experiences and the support from my brothers, I would not have been able to tackle this task of building this business."



ALPHA SIGMA PHI MILESTURES

As we prepare for the 175th Anniversary of our beloved fraternity, it is both important and nostalgic to reminisce of some of the key dates and milestones that have shaped the Old Gal into the organization that she is today. With such a long and rich history, these are some of the most important and memorable events in the history of Alpha Sigma Phi:

DECEMBER 6, **1845**

Arguably the most significant date, Alpha Sigma Phi simply would not exist if our founders Manigault, Rhea and Weiser had not met on this date to lay the foundations for the new Sophomore Society at Yale University. Thus, Alpha Chapter of Alpha Sigma Phi was born.

JUNE 26, **1846**

On this date, Alpha Sigma Phi became public, announcing its first initiate class to the College at Yale.

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NOVEMBER 1847

The Tomahawk is born as a response to an attack on The Yale Banger and thus becomes the oldest college fraternity publication. It has been continuously published since 1909 and today, in addition to providing officer and chapter updates, it reports more in-depth on chapter programs and projects. It reports on the achievements of our members worldwide and it reports on Alpha Sigma Phi's changing policies and priorities.



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JUNE 1907

The first National Convention is held in Marietta, Ohio. Now known as Grand Chapter, this biennial event serves as the supreme legislative body of the Fraternity and elects the members of the Grand Council.

march 28, 1907

Alpha Chapter is re-chartered at Yale University, setting off the Second Founding of Alpha Sigma Phi after six members of the Masonic Club at Yale traveled to Marietta, Ohio to petition for charter.

JUNE 12, **1860**

Delta Chapter is chartered at Marietta College. The most significant chapter of Alpha Sigma Phi aside from Alpha Chapter, Delta was the only active chapter of Alpha Sig from 1864 until 1907 when Alpha Chapter sought petition from Delta to re-charter.

JUNE 15, **1850**

Alpha Sigma Phi's first expansion charters a chapter at Harvard University.

MAY 20, **1912**

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Alpha Sigma Phi exists on both coasts as Mu Chapter is chartered at the University of Washington. Expansion in the "west" continues and by 1930, Alpha Sig has added chapters at UC – Berkeley, Nebraska, Stanford, Iowa State, Oregon State, Oklahoma, Iowa, UCLA and Missouri.



FEBRUARY 1932

Ralph F. Burns, aka "Mr. Alpha Sig" is initiated into the Epsilon Chapter at Ohio Wesleyan University. Brother Burns served as Executive Secretary (today known as President & CEO) from 1936 to 1976 and guided the Old Gal through the effects of the Great Depression, World War II, and multiple mergers among other challenges

1939

Alpha Sigma Phi consumes the struggling Phi Pi Phi Fraternity, and in doing so, adds our chapters at Baldwin Wallace, Westminster, Illinois Tech and Purdue, among others.

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DECEMBER 6, **1945**

The Fraternity celebrates its 100th Anniversary! The organization is still feeling the effects of WWII but a merger in 1946 with Alpha Kappa Pi doubles the number of active chapters for the Fraternity. Also in 1946, the Memorial Fund (Now the Alpha Sigma Phi Foundation) is established to provide educational support for the Fraternity. XII



The Old Gal celebrates its 125th Anniversary and adds Undergraduate Grand Councilors to the Grand Council), giving a voice on the governing board for the Fraternity.

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1976

Ralph Burns, Ohio Wesleyan '32, Omega '93, retires after 61 years as Alpha Sigma Phi's Executive Secretary.

XIV

march 2, 1979

The Fraternity welcomes its 100th chapter as the Delta Zeta Chapter is chartered at the University of North Carolina, Charlotte.

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DECEMBER 6, 1985

Third Founding Campaign Chairman and Past Grand Senior President Stan N. Miller, Purdue '64, announced that the campaign had surpassed its goal with a total of \$1.1 million in contributions and pledged gifts.

XVI

1990

Upon his passing into the Omega Chapter, the Fraternity learned that Brother Howard L. Kleinoeder, Washington '35, had bequeathed a total of \$6.4M to the organization; today it remains the largest donation by a single donor to any fraternity's educational endowment fund and fundamentally changed how the Foundation would operate.

2009

A paradigm change in the growth of Alpha Sigma Phi is implemented after Gordy Heminger, Bowling Green '96 is named CEO. After roughly 50 years of operating 50-60 chapters nationwide, the Old Gal grew to 126 chapters and provisional chapters in just five years and as of spring 2020 the Fraternity exists on 179 campuses in the United States and Canada.

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JULY 2006

Our values, private for 161 years, are made public at the 48th Grand Chapter in Charlotte, North Carolina.

XVIII

2002

Dedication ceremony for the Ralph F. Burns Alpha Sigma Phi Headquarters takes place in Carmel, Indiana, where it remains today.

XVII

1995

The Old Gal turns 150 years old. The event is marked by a Sesquicentennial Celebration in Charleston, South Carolina – hometown of Founding Father Louis Manigault. Co-Chair of the event, Brother Leonard Hultquist, Alabama '60, single-handedly researches, funds and publishes a book detailing the life and times of Manigault, A Gentleman from South Carolina.

SEPTEMBER 26, 2015


The Eta Nu Chapter at McGill University in Quebec, Canada becomes the Fraternity's first international chapter and 100th active chapter at the time. Alpha Sigma Phi would later have international presences in Ontario, Canada and Scotland.

JULY 13, **2019**

Alpha Sigma Phi's Foundation publicly announces the 'Campaign TBTM.' This capital campaign had raised more than \$8M at the time of public launch. Its fundraising goal was set at \$10M.

DECEMBER 6, 2020

Alpha Sigma Phi celebrates its 175th Anniversary. The official 175th Anniversary celebration is expected to take place at the 26th Elevate - International Leadership Conference in Louisville, KY in July 2021.

AS OUR COMMUNITIES CONTINUE **TO ADAPT TO A POST-CORONAVIRUS** CAMPUS ENVIRONMENT. THE **OPERATIVE QUESTION FOR** FRATERNITIES AND SORORITIES IS: HOW DO WE CONTINUE TO ADD VALUE TO THE UNDERGRADUATE **EXPERIENCE?**

Brett Graves, Chicago '18, President of our chapter at Chicago University, acknowledged that there is no straightforward or recommended path to operate remotely. Knowing that all organizations are facing the same uncertainties, Graves worked diligently over the summer to prepare his chapter for success, anticipating the challenges presented by a remote learning environment and how it would affect chapter operations. More importantly, Graves was focused on building a stronger fraternity while adding value for brothers across the globe by focusing on the future.

Having recently graduated a large Founding Father class - a challenge many of our chapters have recently experience - Graves wanted to ensure that those alumni members stay engaged.

"We're planning to work with our new alumni network to help freshmen and sophomore [members] work toward their career goals. We have alumni [working in] big tech and finance, and a lot of our younger members are looking to move into the same fields. I'm hoping to provide a few virtual networking and career prep events where younger guys can get a head start over their peers in terms of resume and cover letter prep or with informational interviews."

Graves suggests other chapter presidents take time to clean up their alumni contact information and build a newsletter or social media page that connects your remote membership.

Graves anticipates that recruitment will look quite different compared to a typical semester and has heard that some organizations have considered pushing recruitment off until the winter or spring terms when campuses, hopefully, return to a more normal schedule. If your campus is adopting a full or mostly remote learning model, recruitment will be difficult, but there are strategies being shared.

Sam Franzoia, Chico State '12, Director of Provisional Chapter Development, has been leading the effort with Alpha Sigma Phi's Headquarters to prepare for virtual fraternity operations.





"We have heard over and over again throughout the summer how important the fraternity experience is to our members regardless if it is virtual or in-person - especially during these times," he said. "As a fraternity, our primary focus since March has been to help ensure all of our chapters were remaining safe but also connected and keeping brotherhood strong. Our staff took a hands-on approach to work with every chapter on shifting to a virtual experience by creating and utilizing several virtual resources, including a Virtual Fraternity Experience and Virtual Recruitment resources that supported our chapters through the end of spring/beginning of summer."

Going into the fall, our chapter coaches developed dozens of resources to assist with a school year that will look different than anything we've seen, including a 52-Week Virtual Brotherhood Experience and 52-Week Virtual Recruitment Plan, breaking down ways for brothers to stay connected, engaged and recruiting even if they're virtual. While things will certainly look different this fall, we're committed to helping our Chapters and Provisional Chapters adapt and continue to grow while having an engaging and fulfilling Fraternity experience."

Additionally, chapters are encouraged to review those free recruitment resources and listen to alumni Matt Mattson, Grand Valley '99, discussing Phired Up's virtual recruitment model.

"Having a plan and reasonable goals for recruitment is essential to the annual sustainability of your chapter. We don't want to allow the pandemic to become an excuse for failing to meet our goals, and at the very least, we should be thinking about how to replace the brothers we know will be graduating this year to maintain our membership. Of course, this also has important ramifications on your chapter's budget."

How has your executive board revised the budget for the fall? What are your baseline costs without having as many, or any, in-person social or brotherhood events? At Chicago,

brothers will be continuing to pay dues at the full cost of a typical quarter but anticipate having surplus funds to roll-over into the winter or spring to subsize more events and, likely, a robust recruitment calendar if classes are able to resume in-person. This might not be the right model for your chapter but it will help to keep your bills paid, especially if you are concerned about maintaining housing or staying current on membership payments.

Something to consider: being able to work through the fall semester with an austere budget could help your chapter to overcome one of the most common recruitment challenges by significantly reducing the membership dues for new members.



THE BIGGER PICTURE:

Our country is going to be dealing with the fall-out of the coronavirus pandemic well into 2021 with system-wide impacts on healthcare, education and the economy for the indeterminate future. As leaders on campus and in our communities, Alpha Sigma Phi should be thinking about how we can provide charity and stability for our neighbors in need. Yes, maintaining brotherhood with virtual video game tournaments is important. But have we taken the time to check-in with our brothers personally to ask how they are doing? Do we know if someone's family lost a loved one to COVID-19? Did your friend or family member lose their job when the economy suffered? Do you feel like your school has done enough to provide a safe environment to return to? We can help in this recovery process. We could transform TBTM scholarships to help students who have unexpected financial hardships. We should be organizing virtual food and clothing drives, hosting public informative webinars with professors, staff, and other campus leaders, and registering people to vote.

I think we will find adapting to a virtual era of fraternity much easier if we constantly seek to build an organization that commits to the service of others. Like-minded students will join organizations committed to community service and members will find value in helping each other.

Be safe. Be conscientious. Be kind.

Our chapter has adjusted to trying to manage ourselves during this time of COVID-19. We talk a lot about being brothers and keeping close with more brotherhood events, but a few of us got to thinking, 'is brotherhood the same as fraternity?' What does brotherhood <u>actually</u> mean?

The great British pop group and part-time philosophers, The Hollies, sang their way to the top of the charts in the 1960s and '70s with ballads like "The Air that I Breathe" and "Stop Stop Stop." In 1969, they wrote and produced the meaningful "He Ain't Heavy, He's My Brother," inspired by numerous stories of one person caring for another.

That vital link of caring for each other has been the basis for the word 'brotherhood' since it made its debut in England in 1300 in the Middle English form brotherhede, which basically meant sons of the same parents. Since English is a living language, not surprisingly the word 'brotherhood' evolved to mean an association of men for any purpose, like the military, labor unions, and . . . fraternities.

When Alpha Sigma Phi uses the phrase 'the Brotherhood,' we typically are referring to all of us – undergraduates, alumni and those who came before and left their legacies for us. But when we speak of 'brotherhood,' we mean the experience of our association with each other.

Many believe that experience is somewhat magical, mysterious and compelling. We experience brotherhood because of shared values and a commitment to help each other live the lessons of our ritual. Brotherhood has deep, personal meaning. It is a reliance on each other and an accountability to each other. An understanding that our personal agenda as members is open and for the good of the whole, not hidden and aimed at singular gain. It is carrying each other to the pinnacle of life. It is bettering ourselves as we work together to Better the Man.

Brotherhood is not transactional. It's transformative. And we are blessed to share the binding goodness of Alpha, Sigma and Phi.
