Introduction

Over the last 19 years, an average of 196 depredation permits were issued for cougars per year, and an average of 93 cougars have been legally killed on depredation permits annually across the state of California. The vast majority of permits issued for cougars occur in non-commercial settings, and changes in husbandry practices could drastically reduce the amount of permits issued.

Assistance Program

Why use our service?

Intensified development outside urbanized areas has increased the potential for interactions between humans and cougars. One outcome is that hobby livestock and some pets may be preyed upon by cougars.

Building a pen for domestic animals is one of the best ways to safeguard them from future depredation.

The Pen Building Assistance program offered by the Cougar Conservancy may provide financial assistance for homeowners who want to build protective pens.

Who is eligible?

This program offers financial assistance to individuals interested in constructing cougar-resistant pens.

Due to limited resources, priority is given to those who have had a verified loss of a pet or hobby livestock by a cougar.

What is the compensation?

Cougar-Proof Enclosures

If a resident has unprotected pets or livestock they wish to protect, individuals may be eligible to receive a cougar-proof enclosure.

Materials to construct a typical protection pen are estimated at \$750 - \$1,500 depending on the size and materials used. Our team can also help with the retrofit of existing structures.

• Carcass Disposal

When there are financial barriers for the proper disposal of depredated animals, we can assist community members with remains disposal.

Assistance may be adjusted under certain conditions, at the discretion of the Cougar Conservancy.
